Welcome to our monthly newsletter, which will keep you up to date on what we're doing to keep communities safe in Colchester. It will focus on:

The Community Policing Team includes the Town Centre Proactive Team. Their work includes responding to issues and carrying out proactive work, including public engagement, crime prevention, crime disruption, and safeguarding vulnerable people. The teams include specialist Missing Persons and Children'and Young Person officers, who work with partners in education and social care to protect vulnerable people from harm.

The Local Policing Team's main role is to respond to calls for assistance from members of the public, but they also carry out proactive patrols.

Our Colchester community and local policing officers are supported by detectives working in the Criminal Investigation Department, Domestic Abuse Investigation Team, and Crime and Public Protection Command. They investigate the more serious crimes that occur in north Essex, safeguard victims and bring offenders to justice.

Colchester has a very clear focus on:

Violence – disrupting those who commit serious organised crime and to dismantle the supply of controlled drugs in the district. We will target those who carry knives and commit violence, ensuring Colchester remains a safe place for all.

Vulnerability – we will ensure we engage with our communities to understand their needs and deliver policing to safeguard those who are vulnerable in our community.

Victims – we will provide victims with a first-class service.

Visibility – we will be visible in our communities to provide reassurance and reduce the fear of crime.



This is a map of the are covered by the Colchester's policing team. As you can see we cover area's previously mentioned like the town centre, but also more rural areas such as Boxted and Fingringhoe and also area's such as Tiptree, Wivenhoe and Mersea Island. Along with all of the villages in between.

We continue to ensure all of our communities are kept safe by undertaking patrols of each area and working with our partners in all area's to ensure the Colchester district remains a safe place for people to live, work and visit.

January sees us deploying as part of a National Neighbourhood Policing Week celebrating the work of our Community Policing Team and we will share some of those stories in the next edition.

Tackling Nuisance Vehicles

This month we have continued to make Colchester a safer place to live, visit and work through our continued efforts to reduce anti social behaviour in the town.

Throughout the end of November and December we have been focusing on the continued reports of nuisance vehicles across the district, seeing the most complaints come from Abberton, Blind Lane, Stanway and several business park. We have been speaking to local residents and councillors about how we can work together and resolve the issue.

We have been utilising our roads policing unit and specialist departments who have been deploying with the community policing team to these locations. Some of the reports are regarding the manner in which vehicles are being driven which causes danger for other road users.

Officers have been using their powers under section 59 of the police reform act and issued community protection warnings to those who are around and causing anti social behaviour, meaning if these people continue to do so, we have the power to seize their vehicle, and they could face prosecution.

We have also conducted speeding operations around these area's whereby fixed penalty notices have been issued.

If you witness road traffic offences you can report them to the below website—there is some criteria and evidence you require to submit

Throughout the month we have been working with partners to reduce ASB within the town centre by conducting joint disruption patrols and also been supporting local shops and businesses in the build up for Christmas. If you see our officers outside a shop, please feel free to go and say hello and pass on any issues you may be experiencing in your area for us to listen and act where we can.





Working with Schools

Our CSEO's have been lucky enough to visit several primary schools around the district and complete some work with them.

We visited Cherry Tree Primary School due to their school council having concerns about speeding motorists passing their school. We have completed speed checks here before but we thought this time we could make it more impactive. The school council at Cherry Tree joined us for our speed deployment, learning how to use the radio's, complete checks on cars and how to use the speed guns.

The children caught in excess of 10 drivers speeding in the hour we were out, all of whom were spoken to by the children who explained the dangers of them speeding in front of their school.






We have also been continuing our work in educating young people in the way their behaviour outside of the home can affect their community. We have been running a missing person scenario with Year 6 children whereby they investigate the circumstances of a teenage boy going missing—luckily each time so far we have found him, however to hear some of the things he has been up to, creates a very interesting conversation each time with the classes to hear their thoughts and experiences of anti social behaviour and peer pressure. 
letter you can see some of the fantastic work children from **Montgomery Junior school** have completed around what they have learnt from the session about anti social behaviour and peer pressure.

Driving down drug driven violence

Officers in Colchester have arrested a number of people as part of a coordinated strike against drug-driven violence in the town.

On 9th December 2022, officers from Essex Police Serious Violence Unit, Colchester Community Policing Team, North Disruptor Team and Operational Support Group executed ten warrants at addresses across the town which we suspect to be linked to drug dealing and associated violence. During the warrants we seized a large amount of suspected Class A and Class B drugs and more than £20,000 in cash. Among those arrested this morning are two men, aged 31 and 24 and from Colchester, on suspicion of GBH with intent.

In addition to our strikes 9th December 2022 we conducted a further number of warrants were executed on 14th December whereby further class A and B drugs were recovered.





In total we charged 16 people with a range of offences, including charging people with GBH with intent, Supplying Class A drugs and possession with intent to supply class A drugs.

Not stopping at the charges laid, we have also worked with the licensing team and Colchester Borough Council and given notice on two licensed premises for their licenses to be reviewed due to the information gathered during the investigation.

Chief Inspector Rob Huddleston, Colchester District Commander, said:

"Colchester has an incredibly lively town centre – one which we know attracts many people from outside the town.

"And while the vast majority of people visiting our town and our venues are enjoying themselves safely and are simply out to have a good time, the reality is some are not; some people are intent on using the town to sell drugs.

"We have been consistent in our message to drug dealers; you are not welcome here. Drug dealing and the violence which goes with it are not welcome in our town.

Today, we have carried out a large-scale operation which involved many teams from across the force coming together in coordinated action in support of local officers, to keep Colchester safe.

"But it is just one element of our operation, which will remain ongoing.

"Where appropriate, we will offer support to those who need it, but we also need to bring justice for the communities which are being impacted.

"My priority is to ensure our incredible town remains safe for the people who live, work and study here and the thousands of people who visit it each year."





Operation Matterhorn



Operation Matterhorn saw more than 140 Special Constables work alongside Police Staff, Cadets and Active Citizens to target different areas of policing including high harm offenders, drugs, and County lines and ASB.

Colchester saw a team of 15 officers deployed to two main locations within the district in uniform and plain clothes supported with a knife arch to look to disrupt and deter criminality. The team used the deployment to create brilliant engagement opportunities to re-assure the public.

The team of volunteer officers worked over 120 hours, carrying out 7 stop and searches. Three of these stop and searches were positive for Cannabis, MDMA and Drug Paraphernalia in various forms. Police Information reports were submitted, and the team reported engaging with over 330 members of the public.

Further officers from our special constabulary undertook patrols in our rural villages and even found a disqualified driver driving around. Safe to say the officers seized his vehicle and have completed the paperwork to ensure the driver gets another court appearance.



Special constables are volunteer police officers so what they have achieved in one weekend is a great example as to the value they add to the force. They have all of the same powers, uniform and equipment as your full time police officers and sacrifice their own time to make our communities safer.

Throughout the evenings we visit a number of venues to discuss how they are keeping their customers safe and also using new equipment whereby we have been carrying out random testing on drinks to ensure they have not

been spiked.



Look after that new stuff from Christmas

Over Christmas you may have been lucky enough to have received some new IT and other gifts, but have you helped protect them yet?

Where applicable have you registered your purchase with the relevant company it may help with future possible updates and the serial number will be assigned to you with the company. Depending on the item and value have you considered adding it to your home or other insurance?

Have you thought about **recording the serial numbers or property marking** it? Be it a cycle, electrical goods, tools, garden equipment or mobile phone it may have a serial number. There are a number of secure asset recording companies such as www.immobilise.com, www.bikeregister.com. Property can also be marked in a number of different ways depending on the item of property such as engraving, marking with indelible or UV pens, and there are marking products such as: SelectaDNA, SmartWater, CRE mark by CRE products to name but a few (always check the suitability of the method of marking for the property item).

With <u>jewellery and antiques</u> don't forget to **take photographs** of it, include an "Object ID card" or ruler in a photograph to give it a scale. Some of these property marking products may also be suitable for these and you can now upload photographs of your property to Immobilise too.

Many TV's, personal music devices, computers and other electronics come pre-loaded with security and/or tracking software, make sure that it is activated. If you are storing valuable college work or other on a laptop or mobile device don't forget to back up your work elsewhere just in case you lose it or it is stolen.

<u>Smart phones/mobile devices:</u> Don't forget to make a note of the **IMEI number** of a mobile phone, to find it key in *#06#, with this if it's stolen you can block it. You can **download an "App" on mobile phones** to find your phone and more importantly wipe that data stored on it, check your "App store" or mobile phone provider. A little reminder -When texting or talking on phones or listening to music **remain "in touch" with your surroundings**, a number of road accidents, thefts and assaults occur when we fail to note what's going on around us, don't forget to pass this advice on to children.
