Anthony Stammers, 27, was last seen leaving his family home in Mile End Road, Colchester, at about 10am on May 27, 2012.

The talented musician sent a text message to his mum, Julie, at 11am asking her to make sure his trousers were ready for his grandfather's funeral the next day.

But when he did not arrive at Colchester Crematorium for the service on May 28, his parents reported him missing to police.

Despite widespread searches of the town and appeals for information, Anthony has not been located.

In the last decade, we have followed up potential sightings of Anthony in areas such as Colchester, Staffordshire, Birmingham, Doncaster and London.

Unfortunately, none have yielded any significant lines of enquiry. Friday 27 May, 2022, marks ten years since he was last seen, and his parents Julie and Robert are appealing for anyone who has seen Anthony, is with him or knows where he is to please get in touch. Living a dual existence

Dad Rob said: "We really live a sort of dual existence. One the one

hand, we know we have to live 'normal life'; there are things to do and bills to pay and we have two other children who deserve to live their lives to the full. And on the other hand, we know that Anthony is missing and the pain that goes alongside that can rear its head at any time."

Mum Julie added: "There were, and still are, days when you feel like you don't want to get up, but I remember what Rob has said to me before, that today could be the day we find him. That's what keeps us going; that and very dear family and friends.

"My heart also aches for our other two children so much because it is their brother who is missing, and they were very close before Anthony went missing.

"His sister, Cathy, was always like a mini-mother to Anthony and his brother James had grown very close to him too.

"For a long time, one of us always had to be in the house because we couldn't bear the thought of Anthony



coming back and no one being here. You do move on from that and you put other things in place to make sure nothing is missed when you are out."

On the day Anthony went missing, he was carrying a record holder-style bag and spoke to his mum as he left, telling her he was going out for a while and was likely to stay overnight at a friend's house before attending his grandfather's funeral planned for the next day. Julie said: "For some reason, I really don't know why, on that occasion I clocked him head to toe and took in everything that he was wearing. "He texted me asking to make sure his trousers were ready for the funeral – and that was the last contact we had."





Enquiries found Anthony had withdrawn money from a nearby petrol station during the morning and that is his last-known bank transaction.

"When he missed the funeral the next day, we reported him missing," Julie added.

"Honestly, the police couldn't have been better; they took what I was telling them seriously and you could tell this was a priority from the word go.

"Through the work we've done with the Missing People charity you do hear of some police forces not dealing with missing people well but I can honestly say, the police in Colchester were and still are absolutely brilliant. "I know it was a job for them and they may have been working on so many other things but we really felt they did all they could for us."

Rob added: "We co-ordinated our efforts with the police, who were searching night and day. I spent most nights out driving around Colchester, just looking, leaving posters.

"I did that for about six months, always in co-ordination with the police, and at the end of that, we really just concluded that he wasn't in Colchester."

Anthony's family have never given up searching for him and our investigation into his disappearance has never closed.

We routinely review national databases for traces of bank transactions, international movement, NHS information and employment.

Julie said: "You never move on, you don't really even 'deal with it', you 'get through it'; that's what we do.

"Today could be the day we find him. He is such a kind and gentle soul, very socially aware and is one of those people who really respected and loved the older generation. If we were ever at an event, you just knew he would be the one with older group, listening to the stories and taking it all in."

To mark ten years since Anthony was last seen, the family are completing a series of fundraising events to raise money for the charity, Missing People, from which they have received huge support.

Anthony's older brother, James, who lives in Bristol has recently appeared in the Channel 4 show, SAS Who Dares Wins through which he hoped to raise the profile of Anthony's disappearance.

On Friday, he will set off from Kingston-upon-Thames, where Anthony attended university, to run through the day and night to arrive in Colchester Castle Park on Saturday morning.

His arrival will coincide with the final throes of a fundraising drive by Julie and Rob, who are aiming to walk 50km in ten days, ending with the Colchester Park Run, which takes place every Saturday.

All proceeds will go to the charity.

Julie said: "When you're a part of this club – the club that nobody wants to be a part of – you find that, really, these are the only people who really understand how you are feeling.

Thirty Essex Police detectives were involved at the height of the police search for Anthony.

Despite their efforts, and those of other staff and officers involved, the search was scaled back and subsequently ceased after no significant leads emerged. If you have any information about where Anthony is, then please get in contact with us.

Anthony is decribed as white, 5ft 10ins, and is of medium build, with short, dark-brown hair, although he may now have longer hair or changed its colour and could also have a beard.

He was last seen wearing blue jeans, a red and blue checked shirt, carrying a black satchel and may have been wearing a black New York Yankees baseball cap and beige jacket.

Joint Operation in Colchester to prevent illegal sales to children

Colchester Town Policing Team worked closed with the special constabulary, trading standards and our volunteer police cadets to investigate reports of shops in the town selling age restricted items to children. Over the course of the day our police cadets visited 14 shops across the town centre attempting to buy items such as alcohol, knives, tobacco and vapes.

Trading standards were present to take action against any shops failing to refuse the sale of such items and out of the 14 shops, 6 of them have required trading standards intervention.

These operations run regularly to ensure our children and young people are not put at risk by being able to purchase items they should not be

On 19th May the community policing team responded to reports of drivers speeding and regularly using their phones in the town centre.

Following a 15 minute deployment in the area, 7 drivers were issued fixed penalty notices for offences such as driving while using a handheld device and failing to wear a seatbelt.

It's a timely reminder that taking your eyes off of the road for a split second to look at a phone could cost you a lot more than points and a fine, so act responsibly and do not use your phone while driving.

Multi agency work to keep people in Colchester safe

At the end of May 2022 the Community policing team conducted patrols and visits of a number of premises in Colchester with the gangmaster and labour abuse authority, modern slavery team and victim navigator team. The purpose of these patrols and visits were to identify businesses and workers who had potentially been trafficked or had become victims to labour abuse and forced work.

The partner agencies take the lead in these operations but as a community team we are present to help build intelligence and to be on hand if any offences are identified to assist in arresting the offender and supporting the victims. Fortunately on these visits nothing untoward was found. If you have concerns over workers or somebody you feel is being exploited you can call Essex police on 101 or alternatively remain anonymous and report through Crimestoppers.

Signs to spot:

Slavery in the 21st century is often enforced by threats to the individual, coercion, abduction, fraud and deception. Victims range from men and women to children, they can be of all ages and backgrounds.





Summertime Home Security Advice

Even if you are at home working or relaxing still consider your home security. As it gets warmer, we tend to see a rise in the number of "Creeper Burglaries" where burglars take advantage of open windows, and doors, and an open or insecure garden gate will provide the thief with access to the back of your home.

A few tips for keeping your home secure:

Don't attract a thief with insecure pedal cycles or cars on display.

Keep side or rear gates, sheds and garages shut and securely locked.

Before going out or 'turning in for the night' lift the blinds or open the curtains and check windows and patio doors are closed, the sun may have been on the TV when it was hot, and so the curtains were drawn whilst the window was open or someone may have closed it, but did they lock it?

<u>Doors -</u> Leave any accessible external door open or insecure and an opportunist thief could pop in and anything lying around may be taken. You may have only popped out, or down the end of the garden or having a quick shower; it only takes a second for a thief to steal. Don't forget that with a PVCu multi-locking door you may have lifted the handle but until you turn the key (or on some doors a thumb-turn on the inside) you have not locked all of the locking bolts in place.

<u>Windows</u> - If you have unoccupied rooms that are accessible to others from outside or off flat roofs make sure the windows are closed, if you need ventilation in these rooms whilst at home at least lock the larger window and only have the small window open even. If you only have bigger opening windows, consider a lockable window restrictor and a small alarm sensor on the window to detect entry.

If you have an <u>intruder alarm</u> activate it when going out and activate the zone for any unoccupied areas whilst in.

<u>Car keys</u> - **don't** take them to bed with you, where possible leave them in noisy drawer/location. Keep the keyless car key fobs in a "Faraday" bag.

If you do hear a <u>suspicious noise</u> in the house that you are not happy with <u>dial 999</u> and make a noise, shout out, it could cause any intruder to flee, they may not have known you were home, remember your life is more important than your property. If safe to do so, get a good description of the person/s and if possible, the car index number and direction of travel.

NB: In case of fire or other emergency ensure that keys to windows and doors are always readily accessible to occupants but not in view of possible burglars.
