STANDING ORDERS

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How to use standing orders

Standing Orders are the written rules of a local Council. They are used to confirm a Council's internal organization, administrative and procurement procedures and procedural matters for meetings. They are not the same as the policies of a Council but they may refer to them. A local Council must have standing orders for the procurement of contracts.

Meetings of full Council, Councillors, the Responsible Financial Officer and Proper Officer are subject to many statutory requirements. A Council should have Standing Orders to confirm those statutory requirements. A Council should have Standing Orders to control the number, place, quorum, notices and other procedures for Committee and Sub-Committee meetings because these are subject to fewer statutory requirements. If it does not, Committees and Sub-Committees may adopt their own Standing Orders.

Standing Orders that are in bold type contain statutory requirements. It is recommended that Councils adopt them without changing them. Other model Standing Orders not in bold are designed to help Councils operate effectively but do not contain statutory requirements so they may be adopted as drafted or amended to suit a Council's needs. For convenience, the word "Councillor" is used in Standing Orders and includes a non-Councillor with or without voting rights unless otherwise stated.

The Standing Orders do not include Financial Regulations. Financial Regulations are Standing Orders to regulate and control the financial affairs and accounting procedures of a local Council. The Financial Regulations, as opposed to the Standing Orders of a Council, include most of the requirements relevant to the Responsible Financial Officer.

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Standing Orders of Stanway Parish Council

Rules of debate at meetings 1. Motions on the agenda shall be considered in the order that they appear unless the order

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is changed at the discretion of the Chairman of the meeting. A motion (including an amendment) shall not be progressed unless it has been moved b and seconded. A motion on the agenda that is not moved by its proposer may be treated by the Chairman С of the meeting as withdrawn. If a motion (including an amendment) has been seconded, it may be withdrawn by the d proposer only with the consent of the seconder and the meeting. An amendment is a proposal to remove or add words to a motion. It shall not negate the е motion. f If an amendment to the original motion is carried, the original motion becomes the substantive motion upon which further amendment(s) may be moved. An amendment shall not be considered unless early verbal notice of it is given at the g meeting and, if requested by the Chairman of the meeting, is expressed in writing to the Chairman. A Councillor may move an amendment to his own motion if agreed by the meeting. If a h motion has already been seconded, the amendment shall be with the consent of the seconder and the meeting. If there is more than one amendment to an original or substantive motion, the i amendments shall be moved in the order directed by the Chairman. Subject to standing order 1(k) below, only one amendment shall be moved and debated at j a time, the order of which shall be directed by the Chairman of the meeting. k One or more amendments may be discussed together if the Chairman of the meeting considers this expedient but each amendment shall be voted upon separately. A Councillor may not move more than one amendment to an original or substantive I motion. The mover of an amendment has no right of reply at the end of debate on it. m Where a series of amendments to an original motion are carried, the mover of the original n motion shall have a right of reply either at the end of debate of the first amendment or at the very end of debate on the final substantive motion immediately before it is put to the vote. Unless permitted by the Chairman of the meeting, a Councillor may speak once in the 0 debate on a motion except: i. to speak on an amendment moved by another Councillor; ii. to move or speak on another amendment if the motion has been amended since he last spoke;

	iii. to make a point of order;
	iv. to give a personal explanation; or
	v. in exercise of a right of reply.
p	During the debate of a motion, a Councillor may interrupt only on a point of order or a personal explanation and the Councillor who was interrupted shall stop speaking. A Councillor raising a point of order shall identify the standing order which he considers has been breached or specify the other irregularity in the proceedings of the meeting he is concerned by.
q	A point of order shall be decided by the Chairman of the meeting and his decision shall be final.
r	 When a motion is under debate, no other motion shall be moved except: i. to amend the motion; ii. to proceed to the next business; iii. to adjourn the debate;
	 iv. to put the motion to a vote; v. to ask a person to be no longer heard or to leave the meeting; vi. to refer a motion to a Committee or Sub-Committee for consideration;
	 vii. to exclude the public and press; viii. to adjourn the meeting; or ix. to suspend particular standing order(s) excepting those which reflect mandatory statutory requirements.
s	Before an original or substantive motion is put to the vote, the Chairman of the meeting shall be satisfied that the motion has been sufficiently debated and that the mover of the motion under debate has exercised or waived his right of reply.
t	Excluding motions moved understanding order 1(r) above, the contributions or speeches by a Councillor shall relate only to the motion under discussion and shall not exceed 3 minutes without the consent of the Chairman of the meeting.
2.	Disorderly conduct at meetings
a	No person shall obstruct the transaction of business at a meeting or behave offensively or improperly. If this standing order is ignored, the Chairman of the meeting shall request such person(s) to moderate or improve their conduct.
b	If person(s) disregard the request of the Chairman of the meeting to moderate or improve their conduct, any Councillor or the Chairman of the meeting may move that the person be no longer heard or excluded from the meeting. The motion, if seconded, shall be put to the vote without discussion.
С	If a resolution made under standing order 2(b) above is ignored, the Chairman of the meeting may take further reasonable steps to restore order or to progress the meeting.

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Sub-Committee meetings

a Meetings shall not take place in premises which at the time of the meeting are used for the supply of alcohol, unless no other premises are available free of charge or at a reasonable cost.

- b The minimum three clear days for notice of a meeting does not include the day on which notice was issued, the day of the meeting, a Sunday, a day of the Christmas break, a day of the Easter break or of a bank holiday or a day appointed for public thanksgiving or mourning.
- **c** The minimum three clear days' public notice of a meeting does not include the day on which the notice was issued or the day of the meeting.
- d Meetings shall be open to the public unless their presence is prejudicial to the public interest by reason of the confidential nature of the business to be transacted or for other special reasons. The public's exclusion from part or all of a meeting shall be by a resolution which shall give reasons for the public's exclusion.
 - e During the time set aside for public forum, members of the public may ask the Council a question on any matter relating to the Parish of Stanway.
 - f The period of time designated for public participation at a meeting in accordance with standing order 3(e) above shall not exceed 15 minutes unless directed by the Chairman of the meeting.
 - g Subject to standing order 3(f) above, a member of the public shall not speak for more than 5 minutes. Members of the public may ask one question, and not ask another until all others wishing to ask a question have been permitted to do so.
 - In accordance with standing order 3(e) above, a question shall not require a response at the meeting nor start a debate on the question. The Chairman of the meeting may direct that a written or oral response be given.
 - i A person shall raise his hand when requesting to speak and, at meetings of the Full Council, stand when speaking (except when a person has a disability or is likely to suffer discomfort). The Chairman of the meeting

may at any time permit a person to be seated when speaking. A person who speaks at a meeting shall direct his comments to the j Chairman of the meeting. Only one person is permitted to speak at a time. If more than one person k wants to speak, the Chairman of the meeting shall direct the order of speaking. Г Members of the public are permitted to film or record Council y 🕶 meetings, to which they are permitted access, in a non-disruptive manner and in accordance with the Council's agreed Protocol. The Chairman of the meeting has the authority to stop a meeting and take appropriate action if any recording is deemed to be disruptive. m The press shall be provided with reasonable facilities for the taking y 🕶 of their report of all or part of a meeting at which they are entitled to be present. Subject to standing orders which indicate otherwise, anything n authorised or required to be done by, to or before the Chairman may in his absence be done by, to or before the Deputy Chairman. The Chairman, if present, shall preside at a meeting. If the Chairman 0 is absent from a meeting, the Vice-Chairman, if present, shall preside. If both the Chairman and the Vice-Chairman are absent from a meeting, a Councillor as chosen by the Councillors present at the meeting shall preside at the meeting. Subject to a meeting being quorate, all questions at a meeting shall р \boxtimes 8 be decided by a majority of the Councillors with voting rights present and voting. The Chairman of a meeting may give an original vote on any matter q XX put to the vote, and in the case of an equality of votes may exercise his casting vote whether or not he gave an original vote. See standing orders 5(i) and (j) below for the different rules that apply in the election of the Mayor at the annual meeting of the Council. Unless standing orders provide otherwise, voting on a question r shall be by a show of hands. At the request of a Councillor, the voting on any question shall be recorded to show whether each Councillor present and voting gave his vote for or against that **question.** Such a request shall be made before moving on to the next item of business on the agenda.

11. Handling confidential or sensitive information

- a The agenda, papers that support the agenda and the minutes of a meeting shall not disclose or otherwise undermine confidential or sensitive information which for special reasons would not be in the public interest.
- b Councillors and staff shall not disclose confidential or sensitive information which for special reasons would not be in the public interest.

12. Draft minutes

- a If the draft minutes of a preceding meeting have been served on Councillors with the agenda to attend the meeting at which they are due to be approved for accuracy, they shall be taken as read.
- b There shall be no discussion about the draft minutes of a preceding meeting except in relation to their accuracy. A motion to correct an inaccuracy in the draft minutes shall be moved in accordance with standing order 10(a)(i) above.
- c The accuracy of draft minutes, including any amendment(s) made to them, shall be confirmed by resolution and shall be signed by the Chairman of the meeting and stand as an accurate record of the meeting to which the minutes relate.
- d If the Chairman of the meeting does not consider the minutes to be an accurate record of the meeting to which they relate, he shall sign the minutes and include a paragraph in the following terms or to the same effect:

"The Chairman of this meeting does not believe that the minutes of the meeting of the () held on [date] in respect of () were a correct record but his view was not upheld by the meeting and the minutes are confirmed as an accurate record of the proceedings."

e Upon a resolution which confirms the accuracy of the minutes of a meeting, the draft minutes or recordings of the meeting for which approved minutes exist shall be destroyed.

13. Code of conduct and dispensations

See also standing order 3(t) above.

- a All Councillors and non-Councillors with voting rights shall observe the code of conduct adopted by the Council.
- b Unless he has been granted a dispensation, a Councillor or non-Councillor with voting rights shall withdraw from a meeting when it is considering a matter in which he has a disclosable pecuniary interest. He may return to the meeting after it has considered the matter in which he had the interest.
- Unless he has been granted a dispensation, a Councillor or non-Councillor with voting rights shall withdraw from a meeting when it is considering a matter in which he has another interest if so required by the Council's code of conduct. He may return to the meeting after it has considered the matter in which he had the interest.
- d **Dispensation requests shall be in writing and submitted to the Proper Officer** as soon as possible before the meeting, or failing that, at the start of the meeting for which

	the dispensation is required.
е	A decision as to whether to grant a dispensation shall be made by the Proper Officer and
	that decision is final.
f	A dispensation request shall confirm:
	i. the description and the nature of the disclosable pecuniary interest or other interest to
	which the request for the dispensation relates;
	ii. whether the dispensation is required to participate at a meeting in a discussion only or a
	discussion and a vote;
	iii. the date of the meeting or the period (not exceeding four years) for which the

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### 24. Restrictions on Councillor activities

a. Unless authorised by a resolution, no Councillor shall:

- i. inspect any land and/or premises which the Council has a right or duty to inspect; or
- ii. issue orders, instructions or directions.

### 25. Questions to the Chairman

At a meeting of Full Council, questions may be put by Councillors to the Chairman provided that seven days' notice has been given of the question. The Chairman may give an oral or written response at the meeting; any such written response to form part of the minutes of the meeting.

### 26. Presentations to Council

External organisations will be permitted, if invited, to make presentations to a meeting of the Council or a Committee.

The Parish Clerk, in conjunction with the Chairman or Chairman of the relevant Committee, will determine whether an organisation may make a presentation.

Both Councillors and the public may be invited to question the presenter, subject to the existing rules on public participation.

### 27. Standing orders generally

- a All or part of a standing order, except one that incorporates mandatory statutory requirements, may be suspended by resolution in relation to the consideration of an item on the agenda for a meeting.
- b A motion to add to or vary or revoke one or more of the Council's standing orders, except one that incorporates mandatory statutory requirements, shall be proposed by a special motion, the written notice by at least 3 Councillors to be given to the Proper Officer in accordance with standing order 9 above.
- c The Proper Officer shall provide a copy of the Council's standing orders to a Councillor as soon as possible after he has delivered his acceptance of office form.
- d The decision of the Chairman of a meeting as to the application of standing orders at the meeting shall be final.
